Lines such as these invite us to an attitude of reverence and awe. All of creation is filled with the glory and wonders of God ... and so often we simply miss them!

For some, our lives become so hectic that we just fail to *notice* what is around us. For others of us, life, although not hectic, becomes so routine that we too fail to notice. And for still others among us, we are just too caught up in being adult ... and so the playful child within us is not given the opportunity to notice what is around us.



Most of us really enjoy being around children (especially when we do not have to care for them twenty-four hours a day!). Children have such a fresh and imaginative approach to life. They see what we often miss ... they see the obvious, while we overlook it.

Remember as a child ... looking at clouds and seeing all the various shapes ... and naming what we see in them? Remember being fascinated with a stream or pool of water ... or delighting in the wind that blew across our face?

Summertime is the season to recapture all this.

Jesus often pointed to children as examples ... not that we should be childish or infantile ... rather, that we should be as open and trusting as children ... as fresh and as open-eyed as youngsters ... for only such as these will really be able to see ... to notice the Kingdom of God's presence right in our midst!

Summertime is a good season to regain our freshness.
